WENDING SHOW 2022 According to Doug McElhaney there will be a vending show in 2022! Vendors are sending in their reservations for booths and are excited it is going to happen. Yes, it will be at the Arena, even if the entire thing must be outside. There may be restrictions in place for Covid, i.e., only so many people in show at a time, masks, etc. – but, maybe not, we'll see what shakes out at the time. Dixie 4-Wheel Drive had a small show at their shop last year and is still

pushing to have it in 2022, but they have sold their shop here in Moab, so who knows??? One thing that is different between the Dixie show and ours, is we don't do the show for profit, we do the show for our participants to let them see what is available to them in the 4x4 world. When vendors reserve their spots, they can either pay cash or donate to the Friday night give-away. what the new people always start off on and work their way up ●eight long time gunners have retired to Legacy memberships.(We thank those new Legacy members for their dedication for all these years.) We will be sending out trail assignments soon (been working on the magazine) – you can look on the website by logging into your profile and clicking on the Leaders & Gunners button at the left of the screen. ▶ One of the big things we had to do this year was cancel some trails due to lack of Officials: Skills Day on Behind the Rocks Tip Toe; Gold Bar Rim, Thurs 8am; Golden Spike, Sun, 4/10; Cliff Hanger on Weds; and we are letting Rose Garden rest for 2021 on Big Saturday.

- ▶ There were 7 Big Saturday(BSat) trails needing leaders this year, the most ever, out of a total 27 BSat trails that run on the Saturday before Easter. We have a wait list of members that want to lead a BSat trail. The next leader is decided by the 1st date someone was recorded as asking to lead one, then if there is a tie, we refer to the date they joined the Club. Although, BSat is not what it was when there was a parade lining the downtown blocks with trails and everyone leaving at the same time it still holds a special place for a lot of people. The last year we had the parade was in 2018 there were 733 vehicles lined up downtown and it took the Police department a record 17 minutes to get us all out of town it was something to see.

You must have been a Club member for one year prior to September 1st, 2020; have attended at least 2 of the last 4 Club events. All this adds to your experience as a 4-wheeler and will help you help others.



According to our Treasurer the Club is doing just fine, we're keeping the lights on! That's important with early sunsets we're having.

LAND USE: Permits are in place for renewals for our events. The mapping of trails hasn't been as easy as was thought. We don't want to put something on the RR4W website that doesn't match the BLM.

- ► John Marsh reported that the mapping of our trails to match the BLM maps is continuing.
- ➤ The BLM (Bureau of Land Management) appears to be loosening up and it seems it is easier to get things. They have new signs and posts for Tusher Tunnel that we need to install.
- ▶ The Steel Bender drop off really needs work, it's dangerous, there was a roll-off into the canyon last Labor Day-no one was hurt. Suggest a jack hammer be used. The BLM wants to fence off a runway everyone has made on the trail too.
- ➤ The BLM is targeting Kane Creek right now; it needs a major overhaul since early in the fall when flash flooding occurred several weeks in a row

Labor Day was a great success this year, no serious accidents or tip overs. A big thanks goes to The Blue Pig for the discount they gave us for pulled pork sandwiches and potato salad, it was delicious. And they supplied a heated box to keep the meat warm.

For the last two years, they've given tickets out when people check in then draw them during the day on Saturday when everyone is on the trail and post them on a board so people can check their ticket during dinner. It was a great way to do it during Covid. Thanks to the Graves family! Thanks also to those who donated prizes for the drawing, Brian Hammer donated a Co2 canister this year.

Gayle Weisbecker and Lourae Minor sold \$1,700 in Club merchandise this year during the event – fantastic job ladies!

The Mason's provided breakfast all three days of the event and as always – it was great, biscuits and gravy, pancakes, scrambled eggs,

juice, coffee and one of them bakes the most delicious banana bread every year – YUM! They get up super early and cook all of it at the camp park.

Labor Day is an event limited to 150 vehicles, not by the number of openings there are on the trails as EJS is. Once we reach 150 of non-gunner vehicles, registration is closed, if there are cancellations registration is re-opened until those openings are filled. If we have people on a wait list, they are contacted first before reopening registration.

FRS & GMRS mobile radios: After reviewing all the facts about these radios the decision was made to not change the mode of communication for our events.
