2019 Easter Safari Grid has been set. Just a few changes were made this year. ●The addition of Buttes & Towers trail on 3 days. ●Lowered the vehicle limits on Kane Creek, all Hell's Revenge trails and Cliffhanger

- Raised the rating on Cliff Hanger to an 8. Cancelled Golden Spike on Easter Sunday because the participant numbers were so far down.
- •Committee meetings to assign Officials for each trail will begin later in Sept. as soon as we receive paperwork back from members wanting to gun.

- Official invites will be mailed the last week of August. Make sure your dues are up to date or you may not receive an invite.
- •NEW for 2019 There will be 3 levels of Registration for Easter Safari. Officials 1st on Jan 15th, Members in good standing, 2nd on Jan 18th, and the Public 3rd on Jan 22nd. Hopefully, this will alleviate the crush the morning registration opens to the public. Member dues must be paid up and if just joining, must be registered as a member one week in advance of registering for Safari.

Cliffhanger Trail – we have an opportunity, with approval from the BLM, to dynamite the wall at the entrance to Cliffhanger. The same contractor that dynamited Hell's Revenge would do the blasting job on Cliff Hanger. Part of the work Mike Kelso has done developing a good relationship with the BLM has them applying for a grant to cover expenses of maintenance in our area. The Club essentially pays up front and would receive reimbursement of \$4,500.

Mike Kelso, Club Pres., received the support of the members present at the June club meeting when he asked for support to propose that Cliff Hanger be designated as a full-size vehicle only trail to the BLM. The creek environ is taking a real hit with the smaller vehicles running up & down to try & locate an exit up to the county road when they can't get back up the first drop off going into the trail.

Cameo Cliffs/Jax Trax – repairs to the washed-out culvert that was too small will be taken care of by San Juan County roads as they have budgeted a larger pipe. Thank you, San Juan County!

Flat Iron - the Club just needs to get a jack hammer and fix the Intimidator as trail leaders feel it has become a threat to safety, even after the repairs done before EJS.

New member to the Board of Directors of the Moab Business Park HOA, Mike Kelso has been busy since he got back from vacation in Ireland in case you can't tell. There is a lot to do as the building inspectors back in the day didn't always carry through the way they should have. We are now under the jurisdiction of Grand County inspectors instead of San Juan.

EJS Bills have been paid said John Martin, Treasurer. The land use fees are close to \$64,167 for the BLM & SITLA lands this year. The BLM raised their fee by \$1.00 this year.

Monticello BLM has extended our permit for the EJS trails in San Juan County to December 2019 Land Use Coordinator, Tom Edwards, reported. He also received something about reporting the stretches of river we will be using - they must think we have a lot of air in our tires to float that river!

"Call off the troops, the BLM is pulling the Do Not Enter signs on the fin on Steel Bender", Katie Stevens, BLM, said about the sign posting that was reported by Nena Barlow last month when she was doing the trail & saw SUWA (Southeastern Utah Wilderness Assc.) members & BLM officials posting them.

Other business:

1a♦ Mike Kelso will be building extra parking barricades (providing free labor).

1b♦ Two custom made trailers, 10' long with side rails will be ordered to move the barricades.

Other non-profit organizations would be allowed to use the barricades and we would be able to take a write off for it.

2. Unit B-8 in the Moab Businees Park has been purchased to replace the 2 storage units we currently rent, this unit is 2 doors down from the Club house.

Will we offer another new Jeep for donations to the MUD fund again? It was a rough year, with the Walker Drug Jeep 60th Anniversary giveaway. The last jeep we had was on our 50th Anniversary, a special edition and was announced at SEMA by Jeep - so it was a good year. This year we barely made enough to pay for the Jeep, so a lot less went to the MUD fund than was hoped for. Only if Jeep comes out with a diesel pickup would we consider it again.

The fire hazard is still on – as evidenced by the 9 homes that were burned to the ground earlier this month in Moab. So, be careful, the whole countryside is a big tinderbox & it goes up in a heartbeat!

"The RR4W TOM, Poison Spider on May 26 had 17 rigs start the run, but 2 turned around mid-way. We were led by John & Carol Martin. I was in the first 3rd of the group so my photos & observations are from that vantage point. The trail rating is 6, indicating that there are some moderately challenging obstacles along the way. The scenery, with trail elevations reaching 800' above river level, was fantastic in all directions. 
Rodeo Club President, and RR4W member, Kirk Pearson, announced he has 80 tons of road base & gravel for the arena and asked the club what to do with it. A plan will be made once we have looked at the arena area.

AREA BFE is going to be a corporate retreat. The owner's lawyers say NO ONE is allowed on the property and NO ONE can have a route through the property. It would appear the owners' insurance company is holding him hostage. The owner said he wasn't worried about us (RR4W), just yahoos running everywhere messing it up. The owner said he would spend \$2 million dollars on lawyers if he needed to, then hung up on Mike.

- •Mike Kelso's side of the conversation consisted of talking to the owner about a leeway for existing routes for Strike Ravine, even though where he is going to build has nothing to do with where the trail is. It was also discussed about perhaps deeding the Strike Ravine part of the trail to the RR4W with easement to consult.
- •Blue Ribbon Coalition is in contact with the owner. It is a Class "B" County Road, and San Juan County has not closed it. The BLM will give us latitude to use the portion of the trail we use for Strike Ravine.

The Trail of the Month Run & BBQ in October is currently still on, we may not be going into BFE space, however, it is the general concensus that the small portion of trail we use should not be closed.


a hemi engine. The tires didn't have soft rubber so it was more difficult to traverse some of the lips on the rock because they wouldn't grab.

We also camped and jeeped in two Deserts they were both beautiful in their own way. With the help

of our host we were able to visit three temples. We camped at a lake in the Tengli Desert and stayed at a great lodge in the Badan Jilin Desert. Jeeping in the sand with a Hemi jeep was fantastic. The scenery was unbelievable the food was wonderful. I've never jeeped with camels walking around before, you can tell I liked them. I had a great time with Mike. He is definitely better at driving in the sand than I am, but I'm willing to go back again and practice more. A trip of a lifetime.
